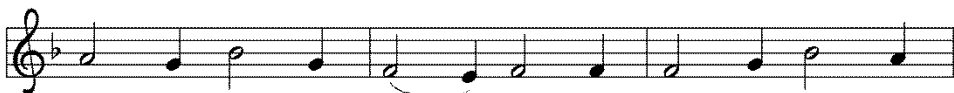

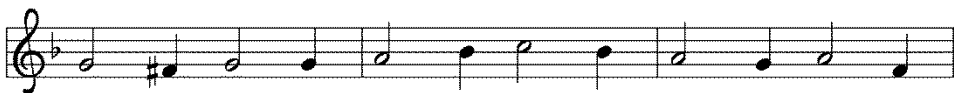

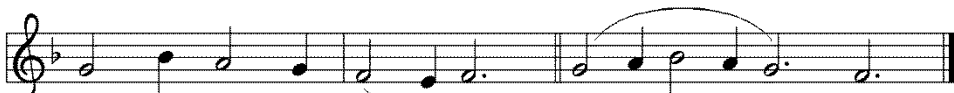

*(sit)***FIRST READING****Genesis 32:22-31**

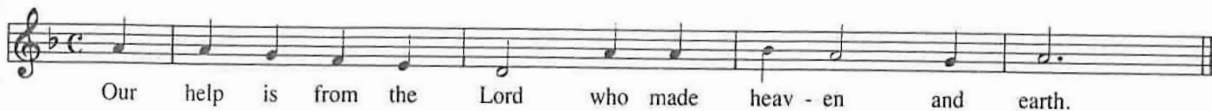
This key story shows our ancestor in the faith, Jacob, to be both hero and anti-hero. According to Wikipedia, an anti-hero “is a protagonist who lacks conventional [heroic] qualities such as idealism, courage, or morality.” That teaches us that 1) God places in each person qualities necessary for saving the world, and 2) God can use us even when we have misused these God-given qualities. Read through Genesis 26-33 to see why Jacob might best be described as a scoundrel. In this mysterious story we almost have to conclude that the “man” is God. So then, why can he “not prevail against Jacob”? In my own experience with God, have I felt wounded? Might God be wanting to transform that wound into a strength? How might God want to use that wound-turned-strength to heal the world and give me joy?


The same night [Jacob] got up and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. ²³He took them and sent them across the stream, and likewise everything that he had. ²⁴Jacob was left alone; and a man wrestled with him until daybreak. ²⁵When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he struck him on the hip socket; and Jacob’s hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. ²⁶Then he said, “Let me go, for the day is breaking.” But Jacob said, “I will not let you go, unless you bless me.” ²⁷So he said to him, “What is your name?” And he said, “Jacob.” ²⁸Then the man said, “You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans, and have prevailed.” ²⁹Then Jacob asked him, “Please tell me your name.” But he said, “Why is it that you ask my name?” And there he blessed him. ³⁰So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, “For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life is preserved.” ³¹The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip.

SECOND READING

2 Timothy 3:14--4:5

Paul continues his instruction of Timothy, his younger colleague in ministry, by emphasizing the importance of faithful teaching despite opposition. We remember this letter was written before the content of our Old and New Testaments was collected into the Bible as we know it, so we are careful how we apply verse 16. How does the Bible give me relief when my ears start itching (verse 3)?

But as for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, ¹⁵and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. ¹⁶All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, ¹⁷so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

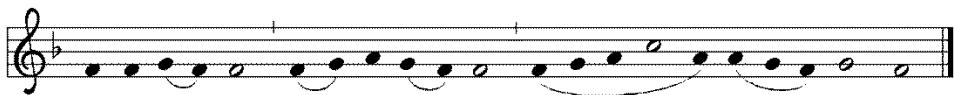

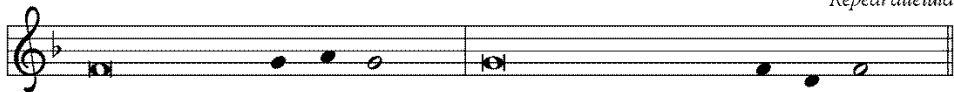

GOSPEL

Luke 18:1-8

Sometimes Jesus told parables to describe God, such as in Luke 15. Sometimes the parable invites a contrast between what humans do and what God does. Such is the case in this story. Can I picture anyone who is like the widow? What about that person inspires my faith?

Then Jesus told them a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart. ²He said, “In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor had respect for people. ³In that city there was a widow who kept coming to him and saying, ‘Grant me justice against my opponent.’ ⁴For a while he refused; but later he said to himself, ‘Though I have no fear of God and no respect for anyone, ⁵yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice, so that she may not wear me out by continually coming.’” ⁶And the Lord said, “Listen to what the unjust judge says. ⁷And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? ⁸I tell you, he will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?”

HOLY COMMUNION All who are baptized and trust in Christ's



presence in Holy Communion are invited to commune at the Lord's Table today. Children not yet communing will receive a blessing. Ushers will direct you. Communion is by intinction: you will receive the Host in your hand; you may then dip the Host into the chalice. It is the understanding of the universal Church that those who wish to commune with bread only (especially for health reasons) have communed fully.

DAILY BIBLE READINGS

These readings are related to the Lectionary readings for this Sunday. We invite you to take time each day to read the assigned Bible passages.

SCRIPTURE VERSE FOR THIS WEEK

Jesus told his disciples a story about how they should keep on praying and never give up. **Luke 18:1 (CEV)**

SAY, PRAY, AND BLESS:

A Prayer for the Week:

CARING CONVERSATIONS

Discuss in your household or small group:

- Who do you turn to when you're in trouble? Why?
- Talk about a time when you asked God for help?
- In the parable of the unjust judge (Luke 18:1-8), Jesus begins by encouraging persistent prayer. His story ends by linking prayer to faith. How is faith necessary for us to be persistent in prayer?

DEVOTIONS

The people cry out to God day and night (Luke 18:7). This week use morning and evening prayers from your faith community's worship book or use Martin Luther's *Morning and Evening Prayers* each day.

Morning: I thank you, O God, through your dear Son, Jesus Christ, that you have protected me through the night from all harm and danger. I ask you to keep me this day, too, from all sin and evil, so that in all my thoughts, words, and deeds I may please you. In your hands I place my body and soul and all that is mine. Let your holy angel be with me, so that the evil one may have no power over me. Amen.

Evening: I thank you, O God, through your dear Son, Jesus Christ, that you have graciously protected me today. I ask you to forgive all my sins and the wrong which I have done. And graciously keep me this night. In your hands I place my body and soul and all that is mine. Let your holy angel be with me so that the evil one may have no power over me. Amen.

SERVICE

In the parable of the unjust judge, the role of the widow represented a person in ancient society who was vulnerable and unprotected. Look to the needs of those who are vulnerable and unprotected in your community or larger world. Find a way to advocate for their needs by contacting elected local or national officials using a letter or phone call.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Jesus encouraged his followers to persist in prayer and to "not give up" (Luke 18:1). It is easy to lose track of some of the things we want to pray for, whether they be prayers of thanksgiving or praying for the needs of family, friends, and the larger world. Find a way to keep track of what you want to pray for. Here are some examples:

- Keep a prayer journal.
- Have a basket with individual slips of paper.
- Keep a list on the refrigerator that you can add to.
