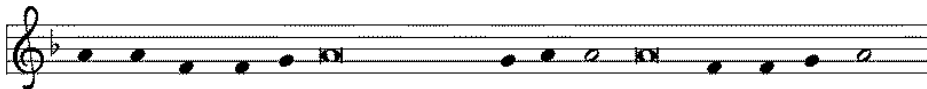

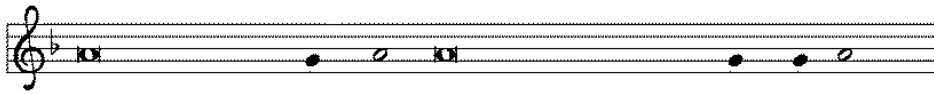

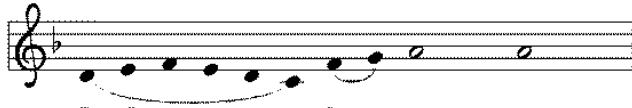

READING

Ephesians 5:8-14

Located in present day Turkey, the ancient city of Ephesus had a famous library, a theater that could seat 25,000 spectators and, most importantly, the Temple of Artemis, also known as Diana, which is one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World. Saint Paul came through Ephesus [Acts 18, 19] proclaiming the free and life-giving Gospel of Jesus crucified. The folks in power realized this challenged the beliefs about Artemis. As a result, this would undercut the economic impact of the temple, including tourism and trinket-sales. Perhaps this is part of the darkness against which the Apostle writes in this letter, addressed to the Christ-followers in Ephesus and to us.

Once you were darkness, but now in the Lord you are light. Live as children of light—⁹for the fruit of the light is found in all that is good and right and true. ¹⁰Try to find out what is pleasing to the Lord. ¹¹Take no part in the unfruitful works of darkness, but instead expose them. ¹²For it is shameful even to mention what such people do secretly; ¹³but everything exposed by the light becomes visible, ¹⁴for everything that becomes visible is light. Therefore it says,

“Sleeper, awake!

Rise from the dead,
and Christ will shine on you.”

GOSPEL

John 9:1-41

The Gospel of John offers a style different from the other three Gospels. We find longer narratives, inviting us into reflection on details. The miracles are given as signs, that is, we ask what deeper insights about God's way of doing things are we to see. Today's reading raises a number of questions: Does Jesus' answer, in verse 3, about the effect of human sin on the difficulties in life, really satisfy us? We are grateful for people who work the night shift, so what does Jesus really mean in verse 4? Saliva was considered to contain the essence of the human—verse 6, see Mark 7:33, 8:23. Does that relate to our knowledge about DNA? Making a mixture of clay was considered work. Do religious regulations sometimes get in the way of God's purpose? In verses 16 and 28-34, can our assumptions get in the way of facts? How does faith grow—verses 12, 17, 25, 30, 38?

As [Jesus] walked along, he saw a man blind from birth. ²His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" ³Jesus answered, "Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him. ⁴We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming when no one can work. ⁵As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." ⁶When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva and spread the mud on the man's eyes, ⁷saying to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which means Sent). Then he went and washed and came back able to see. ⁸The neighbors and those who had seen him before as a beggar began to ask, "Is this not the man who used to sit and beg?" ⁹Some were saying, "It is he." Others were saying, "No, but it is someone like him." He kept saying, "I am the man." ¹⁰But they kept asking him, "Then how were your eyes opened?" ¹¹He answered, "The man called Jesus made mud, spread it on my eyes, and said to me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' Then I went and washed and received my sight." ¹²They said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I do not know."

¹³They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. ¹⁴Now it was a sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. ¹⁵Then the Pharisees also began to ask him how he had received his sight. He said to them, "He put mud on my eyes. Then I washed, and now I see." ¹⁶Some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, for he does not observe the sabbath." But others said, "How can a man who is a sinner perform such signs?" And they were divided. ¹⁷So they said again to the blind man, "What do you say about him? It was your eyes he opened." He said, "He is a prophet."

¹⁸The Jews did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight until they called the parents of the man who had received his sight ¹⁹and asked them, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?" ²⁰His parents answered, "We know that this is our son, and that he was born blind; ²¹but we do not know how it is that now he sees, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him; he is of age. He will speak for himself." ²²His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews; for the Jews had already agreed that anyone who confessed Jesus to be the Messiah would be put out of the synagogue. ²³Therefore his parents said, "He is of age; ask him."

²⁴So for the second time they called the man who had been blind, and they said to him, "Give glory to God! We know that this man is a sinner." ²⁵He answered, "I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see." ²⁶They said to him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?" ²⁷He answered them, "I have told you already, and you would not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you also want to become his disciples?" ²⁸Then they reviled him, saying, "You are his disciple, but we are disciples of Moses. ²⁹We know that God has spoken to Moses, but as for this man, we do not know where he comes from." ³⁰The man answered, "Here is an astonishing thing! You do not know where he comes from, and yet he opened my eyes. ³¹We know that God does not listen to sinners, but he does listen to one who worships him and obeys his will. ³²Never since the world began has it been heard that anyone opened the eyes of

a person born blind. ³³If this man were not from God, he could do nothing.” ³⁴They answered him, “You were born entirely in sins, and are you trying to teach us?” And they drove him out.

³⁵Jesus heard that they had driven him out, and when he found him, he said, “Do you believe in the Son of Man?” ³⁶He answered, “And who is he, sir? Tell me, so that I may believe in him.” ³⁷Jesus said to him, “You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he.” ³⁸He said, “Lord, I believe.” And he worshiped him. ³⁹Jesus said, “I came into this world for judgment so that those who do not see may see, and those who do see may become blind.” ⁴⁰Some of the Pharisees near him heard this and said to him, “Surely we are not blind, are we?” ⁴¹Jesus said to them, “If you were blind, you would not have sin. But now that you say, ‘We see,’ your sin remains.”

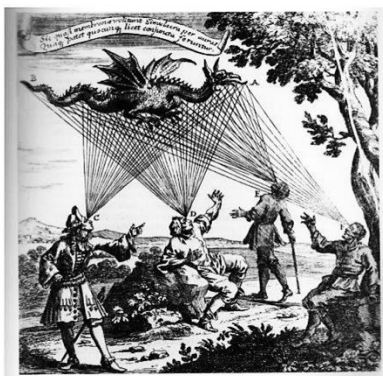

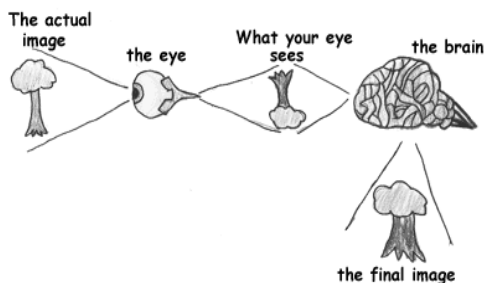
How do we see?

Emission Theory



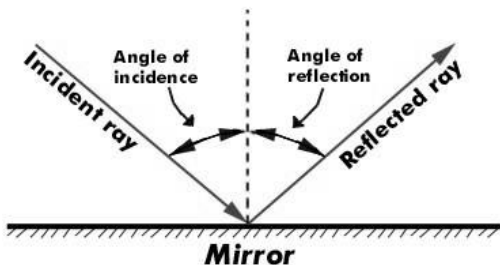

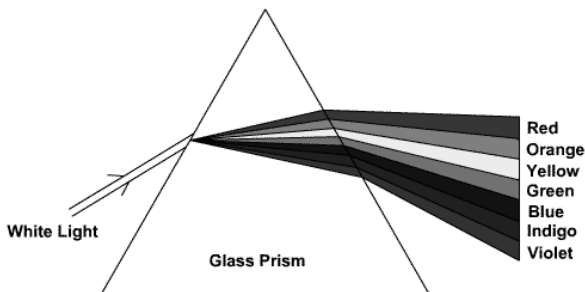


Reflection versus Refraction

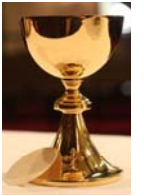

SCRIPTURE VERSE FOR THIS WEEK

You used to be like people living in the dark, but now you are people of the light because you belong to the Lord. So act like people of the light and make your light shine. **Ephesians 5:8-9a (CEV)**

PRAYERS AND BLESSING:

A Prayer for the Week:

Jesus, light of the world, please take away our blindness. Help us to see and believe in you. Amen. (John 9:5-6)

Mealtime Prayer:

Lord Jesus, you give sight to the blind and food to the hungry. We thank you for your kindness and praise you for your goodness. Amen.

A Blessing to Give:

May the light of the Lord shine in your life. May the Holy Spirit fill you with what is good, right, and true. (Ephesians 5:8-9)

CARING CONVERSATIONS

Discuss in your home or small group:

- Tell about a time when you were in a very dark place. How did you feel? What did you do?
- Jesus said, "I am the light of the world" (John 9:5). How does Jesus help us see in our daily lives?
- How can we shine as light for Jesus?

DEVOTIONS

Select a candle to serve as your "Christ Candle" and gather an additional candle for each person present. Read John 9:1-7 or read John 9:1-41 as a Readers Theater or by acting it out. Light the Christ Candle and say, "Jesus Christ is the light of the world." Then, have others take turns lighting their candles from the Christ Candle. As each one does this, say together, "You are a child of the light. Let your light shine before others." Close with the Lord's Prayer.

SERVICE

Since the time of Jesus and his healing ministry, the church has a long history of caring for people with disabilities and for others in need. The church has established hospitals, refugee centers, and orphanages around the world. Reach out to a family who cares for a person with special needs and offer support. You could also select a trusted organization that cares for people in need and make a contribution.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Psalms 23 is a foundational text for our life of faith. It equips us to live our life during the week. It is a psalm of trust that gives promises we cling to when we face challenges. Note that in verse 6, the word "follow" also means "pursue." We have a God who actively pursues us with goodness and mercy. Select a favorite translation of Psalms 23 and memorize it, using it daily this week.
