As we carry on ...

Believe it or not, there are a few positive things that can be said about the pandemic we are experiencing, at least vis-à-vis the church. One is that we're saving money on paper – weekly bulletins and shorter newsletters!

Another is that I get to park out in front of the church on Farnam Street – makes for a fast get-a-way! Yet another is the fact that I know everyone who is attending worship services now, which was never true back when we were the "old normal." Quite frankly, I look forward to the time when I won't. But it has been wonderful to have a few additional faces at worship, even if they're masked faces.

It will undoubtedly be quite some time before we are indeed back to the old normal. Virtually every news cast we watch on TV begins with the Covid-19 score. As you know, things have been heating up in the southern states and also around us. It seems only a matter of time before cases spike significantly in Douglas County. "In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye" (1 Cor 15:52) we might have to shut things down again. Nominating Committee at Work

The Nominating Committee for 2020 consisting of outgoing council members Bob Fonda and Rick Kolkman, together with Cindy Edwards, Susie Henry, Deb Hinrichs, and Pam Johnson met on July 26th to appoint five people to the Congregation Council, one to the Endowment Board, and three people to the deFreese Manor Board. The Congregation Council at its July 21st meeting voted to suspend the rules and have the Nominating Committee appoint people to these positions effective September 1, 2020. We will not be able to hold our normal August Congregational meeting. Those appointed by the Nominating Committee will be ratified at the first Congregational meeting we are able to conduct (hopefully on February 7, 2021).

Thoughts from Deacon Jean Johnson

As we mentioned in June's Good News, Kountze member **Jean Johnson** celebrated her 20th Anniversary as a Deacon of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. We hope to honor her publicly when we are together again. Hear are some thoughts from **Deacon** Jean Johnson:

Back when things were normal......

Remember those days? We went to church to worship, maybe worked at pantry, went to choir or a meeting. We had our jobs, families, relaxing time. Our routines were set - life was pretty good. Then came March and the word Pandemic. All of a sudden everything stopped, or gradually went silent. Life was scary, it was hard - and that has not ended. We had been able to worship, praise God, thank God for our blessings, pray for others' needs alongside our fellow Christians at Kountze. Now....

Words from Micah 6 make us think. "And what does the LORD require of you?

Now, for me, going to church means working at the Kountze pantry, picking up bread and working at Project Hope (the Lutheran pantry at Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church). In March it meant calling members of Kountze to check on them. It means sending cards just to say "hi" or pray for folks who are ill or in financial difficulty. It means picking up groceries for someone so they don't have to go to the store. Jesus said over and over to love your neighbor as yourself. That part about "love yourself" now includes masks, distancing, staying in or not going as far. We do all these things because we try to be good people, but as Christians we have Jesus who has taught us how to live and it is with a different love in our hearts.

"To act justly and to love mercy...

Then came the protests. We realize the hate, the unfairness, the bitterness. It brings a tear, because this time we are forced to take a look at ourselves - our hearts, thoughts and actions. Jesus would want justice, as he demonstrated again and again. Advocating for those who need safety, a chance at a good life, understanding and love. How can we act justly and love mercy in this hard time? But - it is time.

...and to walk humbly with your God."

As much as we miss worship and being together, we are called to be like Jesus as we live our lives in this time. Pray, do something for others, encourage someone, love as God loves vou.

May 19, 2020

The meeting was held in person with proper social distancing and safety precautions in place.

Previous minutes approved.

Presentation was given by Sara Penn and Micah Fannin on behalf of the Endowment Board regarding the Debt Reduction Task Force (DRTF), Kountze Endowment True Vision, LLC (KETV, LLC), and "Kountze Commons." A wide-ranging discussion was had including defining "Kountze Commons;" the Endowment 501(c)3 status; managing the KETV, LLC debt; the church organizational and employment structure; and the continuing mission of the church. The council thanked Sara and Micah and the Endowment Board for their time and efforts regarding the DRTF; KETV, LLC; and "Kountze Commons." A motion was made and approved to register "Kountze Commons" as a tradename with the State of Nebraska.

Financial report given by Rick Kolkman and approved by Council. During the COVID19 pandemic people are supporting the church and its mission, thus financially we are still on firm ground.

Staff reports given and approved by Council. Discussions were had regarding opening services again and the efforts that will be needed to accomplish safe services due to COVID-19. Pastoral staff and council agreed to continue with only the 9:00 AM broadcast during the month of June. The issue will be revisited during the June council meeting.

Committee reports given and approved by Council. Pantry is in need of additional volunteers this summer. Property committee reported the bell has been removed from the bell tower and is on its way to Ohio for repairs.

Board reports given and approved by Council. Endowment Board minutes to be corrected to reflect additional members of the DRTF. deFreese Manor Board working on a 5-10-year plan and kitchen updates have gone well. Clinic is operating at a reduced level at this time with 10+ patients seeing an actual doctor and 20+ patients receiving medications.

The council motioned and approved the establishment of a task force to define "Kountze Commons" and review the mission organization of Kountze Memorial Lutheran Church. "Kountze Commons" Task Force will have five members: Pastor Olaf, Mike Jensen (Council), Paul Sum (KETV, LLC), Gary Clatterbuck (Endowment), Bob Siffring. Closed with the Lord's Prayer.

June 16, 2020

A presentation was given by Ruth Henneman, Paul Sum, and Taylor Brown on behalf of Kountze Endowment True Vision, LLC (KETV, LLC) and the Debt Reduction Task Force (DRTF). Ruth presented the goals and needs of the DRTF, and introduced Taylor Brown. Taylor summarized her experience, goals, and needs as "Executive Director, Kountze Commons." Paul provided a background and history regarding costs and funding of the Kountze Commons project. Approximately \$2,800,000 is owed to the Mission Investment Fund (MIF). KETV, LCC has been making payments but will not be able to sustain the required monthly payments amounts of \$28,000 to MIF. There is a mutual interest and desire among the Council, the Endowment Board, KETV, LLC, and the DRTF to retire the remaining debt.

Previous minutes approved.

Financial report given by Rick Kolkman and approved by Council. During the COVID19 pandemic people are supporting the church and its mission, thus financially we are still on firm ground. The federal stimulus money has been helpful. The construction loan from MIF for roof repairs and stained-glass window repairs is currently \$640,000. Stained-glass window repairs have been delayed for numerous reasons. If MIF does not grant an extension of the construction loan due to the stained-glass repair delays, it will trigger repayment terms. Council has not budgeted for the repayment of the MIF construction loan.

Motion and approval to authorize and open a checking account for the Pastor's discretionary fund.

Motion and approval to authorize electronic (preprinted) signatures on checks and modified bill paying procedures. Modified bill paying procedures as follows: Invoice for \$500 or less, Noni may send a check; Invoice for greater than \$500 to \$5,000, one signature required; and Invoice for greater \$5,000, two signatures required. All other procedures remain the same.

Staff reports given and approved by Council. Discussions were had regarding opening services again and the efforts that will be needed to accomplish safe services due to COVID-19. A lengthy discussion was had by Council. A vote was taken regarding opening services. By a simple-majority council vote, services will remain closed to the general public. A reopening task force was approved to establish a plan for opening church to the general public in the near future.

Committee reports given and approved by Council. Property committee reported the bell is in Ohio for repairs.

Board reports given and approved by Council. Endowment Board grant requests have been capped for the rest of the year. deFreese Manor Board approved an appraisal bid of the building. Clinic is operating and seeing patients. Those COVID-19 likely patients are being sent to UNMC. Pantry is serving more than 200 on Mondays and between 200-300 on Fridays. 24 boxes are being delivered to refugees and COVID-19 patients.

The Kountze Common Task Force is finalizing its letter of recommendation and will be distributed to all interested parties upon completion.

New Business. Motion to allow Taylor Brown access to the church's Servant Keeper computer program. A

lengthy discussion was had by Council. The Servant Keeper program has two components: 1. Membership, including names, address, phone numbers, emails, family members, and attendance; and 2. Contributions, giving by members. Currently, all Pastors, four staff members, and five volunteers have access to "Servant Keeper - Membership", and only three staff members and no Pastors have access to "Servant Keeper - Contributions". A wide variety of issues were raised by numerous council members. A motion to call the question was made and seconded. By a simplemajority vote, the question was called and debate ceased. The motion to allow Taylor Brown access to the church's Servant Keeper program failed by simple-majority council

Closed with the Lord's Prayer at 8:45 PM.

The Spanish Flu Epidemic and deFreese Family

October 6, 1918 - The Omaha Bee Newspaper Order Casket of "Flu" Victims Be Sealed at Funeral.

Orders were given by City Health Commissioner Manning that the casket containing the body of Rev.

Siefke deFreese, pastor at St. Mark's Lutheran Church who was the first Omaha victim of the Spanish Influenza be sealed and remain closed. This order applies to all cases that result from Spanish influenza. Funeral services for Rev. deFreese will be held in St. Mark's on Saturday. Rev. deFreese left behind his widow, Martha, and 4 young sons ranging in age from 5 months to seven years. (The 5-month-old son was Paul Matthew who would later become the second longest serving senior pastor at Kountze Memorial Lutheran Church.)(St. Mark's Lutheran Church was founded on December 12, 1886 at 21st and Burdette Streets, by members of Kountze Memorial Church who wanted to be able to worship in a church closer to their homes.)

October 1918 - The Kountze Memorial Lutheran Newsletter

The Rev. Dr. Baltzly and his wife have been among our members who have suffering from severe attacks of the common epidemic. We are pleased to know that they are slowly recovering.

November 1918 - The Kountze Memorial Lutheran Newsletter A Heart to Heart Message

We have just experienced here in America a most distressing situation: Our churches have been closed from one end of our country to the other. The "House of God" has been silent; with us it has been silent for a month. We wonder seriously, and not without fear, how the Lord God has regarded it. We believe the authorities were entirely sincere in their methods and efforts to combat this dreadful pestilence that has swept over our country. We commend them for their diligence; the heroic service of physicians and nurses during this period will have distinguished recognition in our national history. But that the Church of the Lord God should be closed startles us. If there was ever a time that has called for confession, humiliation, genuine contrite prayer, it has been these last weeks. We wish the people had been called for special prayer and recognition of God.

Nov. 18, 1918 - The Omaha Bee Newspaper Spanish "Flu" More Deadly than War.

The recent epidemic of influenza in the United States caused more deaths than occurred among the American Expeditionary forces. The census bureau announced today that reports from 46 cities having a combined population of 23,000,000 showed 82,306 deaths from the influenza from September 9 to November 9. To date it is estimated that about 45,000 Expeditionary battlefield deaths have occurred.

October 1961- The Kountze Memorial Lutheran Newsletter

On October 6, 1961, the Kountze congregation unanimously called the Rev. Paul Matthew deFreese, D.D. to become Pastor. The Rev. Dr. deFreese graduated from Midland College in 1940, the Central Theological Seminary, Fremont, in 1943 and was ordained that year. He served at Grace Lutheran in Hooper from 1943 to 1949 and First St. Paul, Hastings 1950 to date. His family members include wife, Mina, a Midland graduate of 1940, and four children, Deanne, Paul Jr., Jewel, and David.

May 10, 1980 - Midland College Magazine de Freese's Selected as 1980 Distinguished Midland Family.





Four brothers and their families received special recognition at Midland College as the family of the late Rev. Seifke and Martha deFreese were named the Distinguished Midland Family of 1980. Now that we have begun inperson Worship at 9:00 AM on Sundays, here are a few reminders:

- A family must sit together; children must remain with their parents/guardians.
- Face masks must be worn.
- All the worship materials will be in the bulletin. The hymnbooks will be removed from the pews.
- There will be no physical contact between attendees.
 The peace will be shared but no physical contact made.
 No one is to shake anyone's hand.

The following people are asked to stay at home:

- Those who are sick
- It is suggested that those 65 and over not attend
- People with underlying medical conditions
- Family members who live with elderly people or those who are at risk
- People who have access to those at risk in nursing institutions
- People who have upper respiratory or flu-like symptoms
- People who live with someone with upper respiratory or flu-like symptoms
- People with COVID-19 or live with someone with COVID-19
- People who have been exposed to someone with COVID-19
