- for faith to believe in the ultimate victory of Thy Holy Spirit over disease and death and all the powers of darkness;

Beirut Explosion

LWR Quilts and Kits Destroyed in the Explosion

In addition to the devastating casualties, injuries and widespread destruction, three containers of LWR Quilts and Kits – amounting to more than 47,000 items – were destroyed in the Beirut explosion. These items were bound for families throughout Lebanon struggling with the current economic crisis and COVID-19 pandemic, including refugee families from Syria. LWR is in discussions with staff and partners to determine the most urgent needs and potential response options, with a particular emphasis on shelter, food security and basic needs. 

KMLC Bell Update

The Kountze Bell is still right on schedule and should be back sometime in November.







Pastor Olaf read aloud the "Memorandum of Understanding and Support for Kountze Commons Executive Director Fundraising Initiatives" (M.O.U.). The M.O.U. was adopted by Council by a show of hands.

An update was given to the Council by the members of the Debt Reduction Task Force (D.R.T.F.).

Previous minutes approved as amended.

Financial report given by Rick Kolkman and approved by Council. During the COVID19 pandemic people are supporting the church and its mission, thus financially we are still on firm ground. The church received a \$21,000 gift for the bell repairs. The food pantry is doing well and has received a \$3,000 grant and an additional grant. The construction loan from MIF for roof repairs and stained-glass window repairs is currently \$640,000. Shopping around for better rates and terms for the \$640,000 loan, but might not be much better than what we currently have with MIF. Council has not budgeted for the repayment of the MIF construction loan.

Staff reports given and approved by Council. The Outreach committee working on a memorial board for the pantry. The Property committee has been in contact with another stained-glass company. The Music & Worship

committee met twice regarding the reopening committee and will continue to meet as needed to reopen.

Board reports given and approved by Council. The Endowment Board reported the market has recovered compared to earlier in the year. The deFreese Manor Board awaiting appraisal of the building. The Clinic is operating and seeing patients. The Pantry is serving people on Mondays and Fridays.

The Kountze Commons Task Force has sent its letter of recommendation to all interested parties. The Nominating Committee for Council & Committees is composed of Pastor Olaf, Bob Fonda, Rich Kolkman, Susie Henry, Pam Johnson, and Dan Troxel. Council Retreat Committee has completed a handbook for new council members. Many thanks to Pastor Hall! The Council retreat scheduled for September 11-12 has been moved from Camp Carol Joy Holling to KMLC. Meals will be catered. Motion to donate the deposit money to Camp Carol Joy Holling approved by Council.

Motion and approval by Council for Giselle Loucks' candidacy to Word & Sacrament Ministry. Motion to suspend the rules: postpone the annual meeting, nominating committee will appoint new council members to replace those members whose terms are expiring, and schedule the annual meeting when feasible in the future. Discussion was had by Council. The motion to suspend the rules passed by two-thirds majority.

Closed with the Lord's Prayer at 7:36 PM.

The Book Group met twice since the Covid-19 pandemic began. On June 14, seven members met in the Kountze parking lot equipped with lawn chairs, masks, sunscreen, sunglasses, hats, and lunch/or drink for a physically distanced gathering of fellowship and discussion of two books: Little Women by Louisa May Alcott and Little Fires Everywhere by Celeste Ng. On August 9, we met under the Gingko tree on the front lawn of the church after the 9:00 AM service. Six members sat in lawn chairs to discuss two books: Inspired by Rachel Held Evans, an inspirational read

about the Bible and how it's meant to be read, and how it will change you. The second book was Harry's Trees by Jon Cohen, a book about a grieving, widow, a determined girl, a courageous librarian, and a mysterious book that came together in an uplifting tale of love, loss, friendship, and redemption.

Our book for September is After the Flood by Kassandra Montag, a native Nebraskan who lives in Omaha. This is her first book and is the 2020 OPL pick for "Omaha Reads." It's a dystopian novel that takes place a little more than a century from now after the continent has been overtaken by rising water leaving America's costal cities and heartland an Archipelago of mountain top colonies surrounded by water, characters Myra and younger daughter, Pearl, set sail on a perilous adventure to locate her older daughter, Row, who was stolen by her father.

Kountze History from the



Spanish Flu Epidemic, continued from last month's Newsletter.

During the Spanish Flu Epidemic, as in the current COVID-19 Pandemic, other serious National crises were occurring. Number one was World War I and the anti-German sentiment. In Omaha, Von Hindenburg Avenue, an old county road intersecting Dodge Street was renamed Cedar Ave. Three Omaha High Schools eliminated German Language Classes and urged pupils to study French or Spanish. Germans were being arrested and charged with espionage, which included some Lutheran ministers.

December 1917 - Kountze Newsletter. On April 6, 1917 the United States entered World War I, declaring War on Germany. Our Kountze members are mightily interested in our young men who are in the service of their country. Our good women have been busy knitting sweaters and wristlets to be sent to our boys in service. Mrs. Allen Koch and her two sons presented Kountze Church with a large Service Flag containing sixty-seven stars - a star for each young man in the service.

June 1918 - Kountze Newsletter. Mrs. Allen Koch and her two sons presented the church with a new Service Flag, nine feet by fifteen feet in size to be placed above the choir loft. It contains 118 stars, 117 stars surrounding a large cross in the middle of the flag with one gold star placed in the cross for a young man who has already given his life.

January 1919 - Kountze Newsletter. The great Service Flag with its two hundred fifty-two stars, including 4 gold stars located in each end of the middle cross, represent the enormous investment Kountze Memorial Lutheran Church had in our Country's part in World War I. It is the greatest Service Flag in any Lutheran Church in America. The four gold stars were for: Elmer Kurz and Cornelius Tillman; who both died of the Spanish Flu while at training facilities; Frederick Dichsen and John McCray who were with the American Expeditionary Forces in France. Kountze Church also had 18 women Registered Nurses who served in the Army or Red Cross Nurse Corp.

The Kountze Newsletters, between August 1917 and February 1919, contain 43 letters from Kountze members serving in the military during the war. Excerpts from these letters for the period of Aug. to Nov. 1917, when the men were in training at Army bases in the United States, are shown below:

- July 29, 1917, Camp Funston, Fort Riley, Kans. OSCAR BOYER
 - The weather is very hot, accompanied by dry winds. One can drink water all day long and still be thirsty. I liked Fort Logan better for it is close to Denver and the climate is incomparable. We had a service this morning with borrowed hymn books from the Y.M.C.A. and all sang.
- September 11, 1917, Kelly Field, San Antonio, Tex. 133 Aero Squadron. WALTER THRANE
 Good-bye Fort Logan. Hello San Antonio: I arrived Saturday, this is quite a change and drop 6,000 feet to 300 feet and a change in living too; real Army life now, living in tents and eating out in the open. I am so sunburned I can hardly move my neck and arms at all. It's about 120 in the shade and no shade at all.
- September 23, 1917, Camp Cody, Deming, New Mexico. Co. A, Sixth Nebr. ARTHUR BIXTON

 Arrived in Camp all right, but it is sure some place; sand, brush and plenty of hot sun. Haven't yet got settled down but will be in a few days. Then I think we will like it first rate.
- October 1, 1917, Camp Funston, Fort Riley, Kans. Machine Gun Battalion. FRANK KRETCHMER Weather here is nice and warm. Everybody is pretty stiff; we received our second inoculation yesterday. There are some 40,000 young men down here now.
- November 1917, Camp Funston, Fort Riley, Kans. 356 Ambulance Corp. VICTOR L. NIELSEN

 I was very glad to receive the pocket Bible given by the church. I haven't seen or heard from any other of the boys from church yet. The Camp is so big that everybody seems to be lost from one another in the great military system. You can view the entire Camp from one hill and try to figure out how it was built in such a short time. Marvelous.
- November 19, 1917, Camp Funston, Fort Riley, Kans. Co. D, 355th Reg. CHRIS H. DAMM

 Dear Members and Friends; I received the sweater and wristlets and certainly want to thank you very much. The sweater fits me as though it was made to order and also the wristlets. It's a wonderful thing for the ladies of the church to do such kindness. I appreciate it very much. May God be with you all.

"Jesus Loves Me"

Lowell Yoder of Holland, Ohio recalls that one Sunday evening he watched on television a church in Atlanta honoring one of its senior pastors, who had been retired for many years. He was 92 at the time.

After he was introduced to warm applause, the old pastor rose from his chair and walked slowly; with great effort, to the pulpit. He steadied himself and then quietly and slowly began to speak:

"When I was asked to come here today and talk to you, your pastor asked me to tell you what was the greatest lesson I learned in my 70 years of preaching.
