On Palm Sunday we recall how Jesus entered Jerusalem before his arrest and crucifixion. We often call this the "Triumphal Entry," and we mark this Sunday as the beginning of Holy Week. In their book, The Last Week, Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan present a dayby-day account of Jesus' final week of life. They describe two separate entries into Jerusalem. One is the event we commemorate: Jesus and the disciples coming from the east, from the Mount of Olives. Jesus is riding a donkey. The disciples have spread their cloaks as a carpet on the road. His followers are waving palm branches – a symbol of Jewish national identity – and shouting "Hosanna," which means "Save us, O son of David."

From the other side of the city Pontius Pilate, mounted on a war horse, leads a Roman army from the provincial capital at Caesarea on the Mediterranean coast – boots tromping, shields and spears clanging noisily. It is a demonstration of Roman imperial power, designed to instill fear in the citizenry and reinforce the message that it is loyalty to Caesar that saves and brings peace.

These two entrances mark the conflict that will play out in the events of the week leading to Jesus's crucifixion. It is the conflict between reliance on secular power and military might on one hand, and trust in the way of selfgiving, humility and compassion on the other.

We begin our service by remembering Jesus' entry, waving palm branches, and singing "Hosanna." But then the mood shifts as we remember that the crowds quickly deserted Jesus. We read the long narrative from Matthew 26-27 telling of Jesus' arrest and crucifixion – "The Passion."

I invite you be come be part of our remembering together, not only on Palm/Passion Sunday but throughout the week on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the silence of Holy Saturday. Then we will celebrate the Resurrection beginning with the Easter Vigil Saturday night, and three services on Easter Sunday.





NEWS & Notes...



Financial Report given by Tim Backora. Offerings are off to a good start for the year.

Staff reports:

The sanctuary wood flooring is showing its age. As it is engineered hardwood it cannot be refinished. Jim has been doing some touch up work, but estimates are being sought for possible replacement. Call committee continues to meet.

Committee reports:

Christian Education reports that summer vacation bible school will be held at KMLC. Media and Technology working with vendor for webpage updates. Outreach has placed ads for Easter services. Personnel reports the job posting for the Executive Director position is nearly completed. Social Ministry highlighted the upcoming small group dinners. Worship & Music noted progress with additional choir members. Council discussed restarting CPR training for staff, ushers, etc. The Windows Celebration Task Force has set September 10, 2023.

Board reports:

DeFreese Manor Board reported Kountze Memorial, Inc has been dissolved with some remaining fees to be paid. Kountze Commons Community Outreach (KCCOC) has been incorporated and is working with Personnel Committee for Executive Director job posting. The Food Pantry serves 850-900 people on Mondays and 175-200 on Fridays, plenty of food but could use more volunteers. Old Business:

Approve payment to MIF (stained glass/roof repairs loan) of \$945,000 and to pay additional ongoing current invoices using deFreese manor sales proceeds.

New Business:

Approved James Holzer application for Parish Ministry Associate Program. Dannika Rees as a 5th Synod delegate from KMLC. Streetcar Project Task Force will attend an upcoming open house. Member Paul Carlson addressed the Council and highlighted the ELCA updated model constitution and how it might apply to KMLC.

Closed with the Lord's Prayer at 7:40 PM.

One Year Update on the Bowari's - Our Afghan Refugee Family:

Great news: One year after moving into the apartment furnished by Kountze, the Bowari family is doing very well! As you may recall, the Kountze Refugee Resettlement Committee led the effort to collect all the household supplies and furniture for a family of 7 who had been evacuated from Afghanistan in August 2021. We met the family and moved them into their apartment at 144th & Harrison last February. A month later, their 5th son was born. Since then, the family has experienced a series of milestones, including a few setbacks. However, overall, they are doing well, progressing in their English, and becoming independent. Here are a few of the highlights:

Guldin (the father) is working the night shift at an area Walmart restocking shelves. He originally had a job at one of the Packing plants in South Omaha, but was forced to leave that position due to lifting restrictions related to kidney stones. He was very pleased to find another job that pays even better and has much better working conditions.

Bibi Hawa (the mother) has made amazing progress in her English language skills. No one in the family spoke English upon arrival in August 2021. Bibi Hawa had never had the opportunity to attend school in Afghanistan, therefore is unable to read or write in her native language, Pashto. She is justifiably proud to be able to read and write on a first – second grade level in English. Her understanding of spoken English is much more advanced – to the point that she serves as interpreter for her husband much of the time. It is a joy to hear her express herself in English. For the first time in a year she is able to tell us about herself and her thoughts – communicating at an exceptional level in English.

The two oldest boys are in first grade and Kindergarten. Their understanding and level of spoken English is remarkable. Their teachers are very impressed with their progress in all areas.

The three- and four-year-old boys are growing rapidly and beginning to understand and speak English as well. They have a Millard Public School home visit preschool teacher who comes to work with them once a week.

The youngest, Murad, will soon be a year old. He is healthy, happy, and growing into a force to contend with his older brothers!

I close with the most recent development which will be a major change in the family's ability to become independent: Guldin received his driver's license last






On August 15, 1881, the last service was held in the Emanuel's Lutheran Church's first building at 12th and Douglas Streets. The church and parsonage had been sold to the developers of the Millard Hotel for \$16,000. On October 31, 1881, morning and evening services were held in the new Boyd Opera House at 15th and Farnam Streets, that had been rented for \$15.00 per Sunday. The Opera House was used for over 2 years, until April 9, 1884, when the basement Lecture Room of the new Kountze Church at 16th and Haney Streets was ready for occupancy. One year later on Easter Sunday, April 5, 1885, the first services were held in the Sanctuary of the new church. On February 18, 1889 Harper's Weekly Magazine published a picture of the 10 most beautiful buildings in Omaha, Nebraska. Kountze Memorial Lutheran Church was one of the IO buildings. A framed picture of those 10 buildings is hanging in the Church Office.

The following information was taken from numerous articles in the Omaha Bee Newspaper during the period of 1904 to 1905. Some might feel a touch of sentiment in regard to the news that Kountze Memorial Lutheran Church is to be demolished, long known as one of the show buildings of the city. Indeed, it seems at first thought, a pity that a fine church should be removed to make room for a business house, but reflection indicates the contrary. In the stead of the structure that is now being demolished, a better one will be reared, one that is more accessible for purposes of worship and where the devout can have their moments of quiet meditation uninterrupted by the clang of passing traffic. The wisdom of the church Trustees determined that the sale of the site and the purchase of a new site farther west at 26th and Famam Streets would be advantageous. Thus passes away the old Kountze Memorial, around whose altar the incense of peace has long burned. Judge Neville purchased the land for \$90,000 and will build a three story brick building with commercial stores on the first floor facing both 16th and Harney Streets. The upper two floors will be devoted to office spaces. The work of demolishing the church will begin in earnest after the last Easter Service in 1904. The Church will be responsible for removing the building and will maintain ownership of all materials and contents. The contractor, John H. Harte, a member of Kountze, will demolish and build the new structure. He estimates it will take 40 days to demolish the church since it's location will not permit any fast work. The church must be taken down a brick at a time just as it was built, to save as much salvage as possible. While the new building will be entirely of gray limestone from Missouri, we must save as many of the bricks as possible. They can be used in fill on the new church and Judge Neville has offered to purchase all the church will sell. The stained glass windows, after being worked over, will be used in the new church as will the large wood beams and metal columns. By far the largest salvage will be the roof. It is good quality slate and all of it can be used in the new church. Mr. Harte thought the slate roof, valued at \$600, was the most valuable item of salvage. Today we know the most valuable was the precious historic stained glass windows that are now again being worked over and restored. At an evening meeting at the church on Monday night after Easter, members of the church tore up the tile in the church entrance as mementos of the building. (Check your attics, you might find some of those old tiles) A large force of men were put to work on the Tuesday morning to begin the demolition that started at the bell tower and worked it's way down to the foundation..

Thank you to all who have prayed for and supported this family. God has blessed us all with the opportunity to welcome the stranger and to help them adjust to their new life here as our neighbors.
